**States' Trading Supervisory Board**

**Future Waste Charges**

**AMENDMENT**

Proposed by: Deputy P Roffey  
Seconded by: Deputy C N K Parkinson

To delete Propositions 1. and 1A substitute therefor:–

1. To note the States' Trading Supervisory Board's intention to increase household waste charges annually from 2022 to 2025 by an annual increase of RPIx plus 5% to the "pay as you throw" bag charge for general waste.
2. To note the States' Trading Supervisory Board's intention to increase household waste charges annually from 2022 to 2025 by an increase of RPIx plus £5 per year to the Waste Disposal Authority's annual waste charge.
3. To note the States' Trading Supervisory Board's intention from 2023, to introduce a "pay as you throw" bag charge for kerbside collection of recyclable materials, except for food waste and glass.
4. To agree that household waste charges should be increased annually from 2023 to 2025 by no more than an annual increase of RPIx plus 1% (capped at 5%) to the "pay as you throw" bag charge for general waste.
5. To agree that household waste charges should be increased annually from 2023 to 2025 by no more than an increase of RPIx plus 1% (capped at £5) per year to the Waste Disposal Authority's annual waste charge.

And to renumber the remaining propositions accordingly

### **Rule 4(1) Information**

a) By addressing the current Waste Strategy funding requirements, the propositions will:

- help realise the benefits of the Waste Strategy, through further reduction of waste and more sustainable use of resources;
- contribute to the Climate Change Policy target of net zero emissions by 2050;
- contribute to the Government Work Plan recovery outcome “More sustainable production, consumption and management of resources

(b) The Committee for the Environment & Infrastructure and the Policy & Resources Committee have been consulted in the preparation of the propositions.

(c) The Propositions have been submitted to Her Majesty’s Procurer for advice on any legal or constitutional implications.

(d) The financial implications of the Propositions are included in Paragraphs 8.49 to 8.51.
