



DIRECTIONS ISSUED BY THE
COMMITTEE FOR HOME AFFAIRS

Manner in which goods not cleared from customs charge may be moved within the limits of any port or customs airport, or between any such place and any other place

Legal Basis – *Section 11 of the Customs and Excise (General Provisions) (Bailiwick of Guernsey) Law, 1972, as amended ("the Customs Law")*.

In these Directions "goods not cleared from customs charge" means:

- (i) any goods which have been imported and have not been discharged to a customs procedure following a declaration being made under section 15 of the Customs Law, or
- (ii) any other imported goods for which the Chief Revenue Officer has issued a notice stating that those goods have not cleared from customs charge (generally referred to as "detained goods").

All goods not cleared from customs charge must, as soon as practicable after being unloaded from a ship or aircraft, be moved to a place:

1. within a specified area which is within the limits of a port or customs airport until such time as those goods are released from customs charge. For the purpose of this paragraph, "specified" means specified by the Chief Officer of Customs and Excise by notice in writing or as otherwise notified by the Chief Revenue Officer, as the case may be; or
2. within a specified area at premises approved under section 10A(1) of the Customs Law and in accordance with any conditions issued under such approval. For the purpose of this paragraph, "specified" means specified by or on behalf of the Committee in conditions issued under section 10A(1).

In the case of paragraph 1, goods shall be moved only by persons acting on behalf of the shipper or airline which imported the goods.

In the case of paragraph 2, goods shall only be moved by persons acting on behalf of the shipper or airline which imported the goods or by persons acting on behalf of the proprietor of the premises approved under section 10A(1).
